

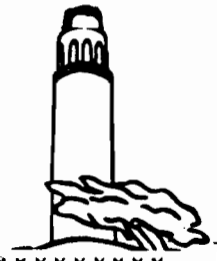

A MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT CAUTHEN

Recently I overheard a city official refer to the Telegraph Hill Dwellers as a "powerful political group", and in the context of our own sphere, we are! You and I are members of an organization which traditionally has been outstandingly successful in achieving its' goals.

Among the reasons for our success is that through a number of fortunate circumstances (not the least of which is the drawing power of a spectacular downtown hill in one of the worlds great cities) several hundred people of dedication and talent have been brought together as neighbors. The members of the Telegraph Hill Dwellers possess both a formidable array of useful talents and a singularly uniform approach to the problems engendered by the mindless rush to dehumanize the American city.

On occasion we are accused of opposing progress. The truth of the matter is that we have been strong advocates of any development which would help the economic climate in San Francisco, provided that it did not result in the wholesale destruction of existing amenities in the process.

In order to continue to be successful in achieving the kind of programs which we all believe in, we must do the following:

- 1- Organize ourselves so as to effectively employ the talents and energy of the membership.
- 2- Seek out and work with allies in other neighborhood and civic organizations.
- 3- Refuse to join those certain civic groups and public bodies and individuals who abjectly surrender their principles to the sources of "progress" at the first hint of controversy, no matter how unpalatable the particular project might be !

Presently, San Francisco and other cities are in a crucial period as far as future development is concerned. Some of the matters before us at the present time, if resolved unfavorably, would do immediate damage to Telegraph Hill and its' environs (examples being the International Market center proposal, questions of zoning and variances, the future of Washington Square). Other key issues such as transportation planning, the rehabilitation of Market Street and the future development of the Northern Water Front area, while perhaps having less impact on the Hill itself, will profoundly affect the future desirability of San Francisco as a place in which to live and work.

Therefore it behooves us all, as Hill Dwellers and as San Franciscans, to follow these matters very closely and to assert our position vigorously whenever it becomes necessary to do so.

As an individual voter, your influence on these and other issues is unfortunately quite small. The Telegraph Hill Dwellers offers you the opportunity to dramatically amplify your political voice on local issues!

We need new participants at this time, particularly people who will assume the responsibility for a given job and then follow through on it! We need organizers, typists, writers, architects, economists and "doers" of all kinds.

If you wish to participate actively in a given program, please contact the appropriate chairman (see list published in this bulletin).

Don't wait for us to reach you, jump into the act now ! It is quite important to San Francisco that you do so, and I can assure you it won't be dull if you participate actively.

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POLITICAL EXPEDIENCY WINS ROUND TWO OF WATERFRONT FIGHT

On April 11, the Planning Commission heard our application for a 40-ft. height limit below Telegraph Hill and a well documented case against the International Market Center. Unfortunately, the hearing was a mere pro-forma affair. Disapproval of the 40-ft. height limit and approval of the Market Center were railroaded through on schedule. Only Commissioner Kearney made an impassioned plea to save the waterfront. It fell on deaf ears.

On May 23 and 29, the Market Center issue was heard before the Board of Supervisors Streets and Transportation Committee. The array of opposing organizations and citizens was impressive: THD, POW, CPC, ILWU, TWIN PEAKS IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION, HAIGHT ASHBURY NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION, WESTERN FURNITURE MART, LANDSCAPE ARCHITECT THOMAS CHURCH, ARCHITECTS OLIVER AND GATELY, ATTORNEYS ROGER KENT AND JOHN HARMAN AND NUMEROUS INDIVIDUALS PRESENTED AN OVERWHELMING CASE AGAINST THE MART. Our case was so irrefutable that the developers didn't dare to offer a rebuttal. They didn't need to: we had the evidence, but they had the votes! Even the shocking evidence that the Mart may acquire city streets at a discount of roughly \$ 5,000,000 (the City Real Estate Dept. is asking \$ 4.80 per square foot for land conservatively estimated at \$ 30) did not stop the politically motivated steamroller. Supervisors Blake and Maillard voted for street vacation for the benefit of the developers, only Supervisor Morrison opposed the decision.

The next step will be action by the full Board of Supervisors. Should it also approve the street vacation, a second hearing before the full Board of Supervisors would follow one month later. This would be our major chance to present our case to the full Board.

CITY OWNERSHIP OF PORT

Assemblyman John L. Burton is the sponsor of legislation to transfer the Port of San Francisco to the city.

San Francisco has sought to get control of the state owned and operated port for about 40 years.

Elaborate and highly imaginative plans are contained in the Bolles Report for the improvement of this all important area. In order to carry out these plans, and to keep proper planning control of this area, it is essential that San Francisco obtains jurisdiction of the port.
